

- Monitor conditions related to the COVID-19 numbers surge

## Potential Reduction in K-12 Growth (pending official October 1 counts)




# Enrollment Estimate Trends:

## Estimated New Enrollments Due to Migration and Other Factors\*

There was a notable decrease in new enrollments (2,837) in SY 2021 compared to recent years.

This equates to a single year decrease of 20% in new enrollment.





*\*Counts are of students whose first enrollment in a Utah public school was **in first grade or higher**. Additionally, counts only include students who first enrolled by Sep 9 of the school year (for more fair comparison with SY 2021, which is currently limited to a poll of enrollment on Sep 9). The reason they did not start in Pre-K or Kindergarten could be that they were previously living out of state or country or may have been homeschooled or attended a private school.*

# Enrollment Estimate Trends: Kindergarten Enrollment\*

There was a notable decrease in Kindergarten enrollment (2,347) from SY 2020 to SY 2021. The next largest decrease was from SY 2017 to SY 2018 (686).

Kindergarten enrollment has not had consistent growth in recent years, though the decrease from SY 2020 to SY 2021 (4.7%) was much bigger than any previous decreases.




# Updated - Enrollment Estimate Trends: Homeschool and Private School\*

The number of students who transferred to homeschool more than tripled in beginning of year SY 2021 compared with prior years.

The number of students who transferred to private school increased by 50% or more in beginning of year SY2021 compared with previous years





*\*End of Year SY 2020 and Sep 9 SY 2021 counts are likely to increase in the October 1 data after LEAs have had more time to update exit codes for missing students (students who did not have an exit code at the end of SY 2020 but who have not yet returned to school in SY 2021).*

# Enrollment Estimate Trends: Online and Virtual School\*

There was a notable increase in students enrolled in Online or Virtual Schools (9,343) in SY 2021.

This equates to a single year increase of 63% in Online or Virtual school enrollment.



# Statute

Effective 5/14/2019

53F-2-207. Loss in student enrollment -- Board action.

To avoid penalizing a school district financially for an excessive loss in student enrollment due to factors beyond its control, the state board may allow a percentage increase in units otherwise allowable during any year when a school district's average daily membership drops more than 4% below the average for the highest two of the preceding three years in the school district.
